BRUSH REMOVAL, CHIPPING, CHIPPER MAINTENANCE (LOCK-OUT/TAG-OUT)



Chippers are powerful. Accidents can be sudden and injuries can be serious. Respect the equipment, use caution and follow procedures. There are **two basic types of chippers: drum and disk chippers.** Understand the differences and how to operate and maintain each.



Before performing any maintenance, make sure the chipper is turned off, the ignition key is removed and the chip disk or drum is locked in place.



Before operating any chipper, **employees must be trained to operate it** and be able to demonstrate to their supervisor they can operate it safely.



Rings, watches, and loose clothing should also **not be worn.**

Do not wear any jewelry, loose clothing or long-cuffed gloves when operating a chipper. Wearing the appropriate PPE is a Key to Life.



Drag brush to the chipper and stack it so it can be **fed from the side** into the chipper butt-end first. Do not pile too much brush near the chipper. Under no circumstances should any part of the body cross into the infeed hopper.

IMPORTANT REMINDER

DAILY SAFETY NUGGETS

- MONDAY**
 What is the basic rule of thumb to prevent chipper accidents? Your feet never pass the infeed tray and your hands never pass the edge of the infeed hopper.
- TUESDAY**
 What is the purpose of the cables often hanging inside the infeed hopper and the reverse bar outside the hopper? Both of these items serve to reverse the infeed rollers which will push items out of the hopper instead of pulling them in.
- WEDNESDAY**
 TRUE or FALSE... It is permissible to put rakings in the chipper if you make sure there are no pebbles in the pile. FALSE: Rakings should never be fed through the chipper. This practice dulls the blades and can allow for items to be kicked back out of the chipper.
- THURSDAY**
 Where should you stand when feeding a chipper? Always stand to the side and on a road, on the curb side away from traffic.
- FRIDAY**
 TRUE/FALSE... It is required to remove all jewelry and not wear loose fitting clothing or climbing harnesses, etc. when operating a chipper. TRUE
- SATURDAY**
 What should you do with the chipper between infeed operations when you are raking or otherwise not feeding brush into the chipper? During these times the chipper should at a minimum be idled down. If you are leaving it unattended or not feeding it for an extended time, shut it down and turn off the engine.
